**Section A**

1. In this experiment, you will determine the density of a sphere.

You are provided with

- five glass spheres,
- two half-metre rules,
- two set squares,
- access to electronic balance.

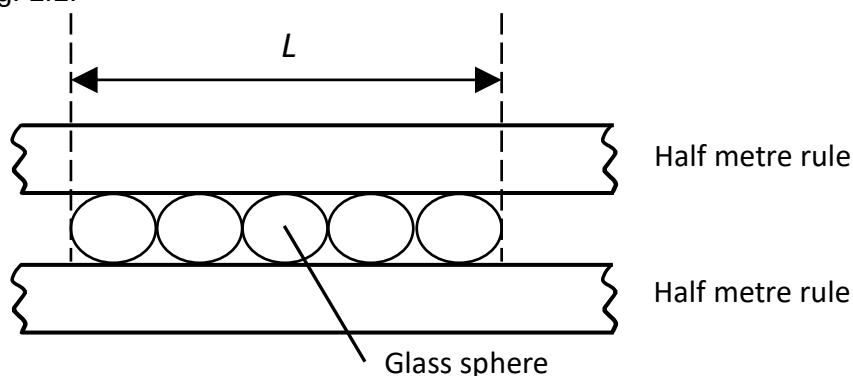
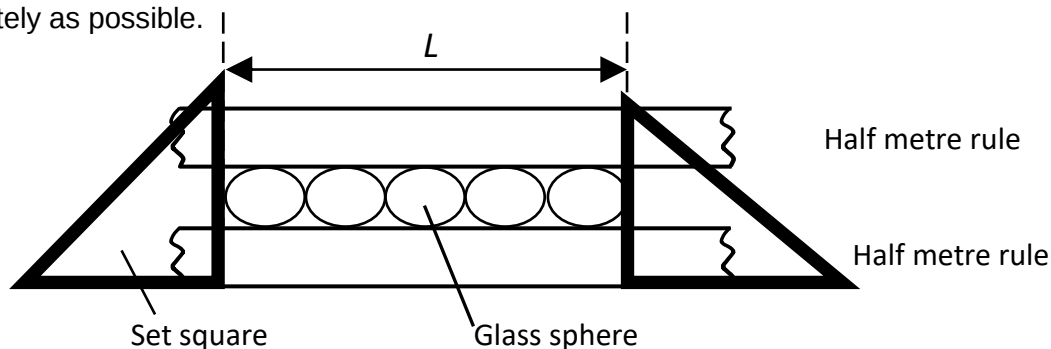


Fig. 1.1 (top view)

(a) Place the two half-metre rules parallel to one another, with a gap between the two, as shown in Fig. 1.1.

Ensure that the spheres are touching each other and are in a line.
Measure the total length L occupied by the 5 spheres.

$L = 8.0 \text{ cm}$ (accept 7.5 to 8.5)

(b) Describe, with the aid of a diagram, how you ensured that L was determined as accurately as possible.



- Use of set squares at each end of the channels to take scale readings.
(accept to grip sphere / hold sphere so that there are no gaps)
- One edge of the set square must be aligned with the edge of the ruler.



- (c) Use your value of L to determine the average diameter d of a sphere.

$$\begin{aligned} d &= 8.0 / 5 \\ &= 1.6 \text{ cm} \end{aligned}$$

$$d = \underline{1.6 \text{ cm}}$$

- (d) Explain why this method of finding average diameter d determined in (c) will give a lower value than the actual diameter d .

The set square is placed below the widest point of the sphere (due to the height / thickness of the half metre rule).

Hence the value of L measured is lower than actual.

- (e) Calculate the volume V of a sphere using the equation shown.

$$V = \frac{4\pi}{3} \left(\frac{d}{2} \right)^3$$

$$\begin{aligned} V &= \frac{4 \times \pi}{3} \left(\frac{1.6}{2} \right)^3 \\ &= 2.145 \\ &= 2.1 \text{ cm}^3 \end{aligned}$$

$$V = \underline{2.1 \text{ cm}^3}$$

- (f) Use the electronic balance to determine the mass m of a sphere.

$$m = \underline{5.42 \text{ g (accept 5.00 to 6.00)}}$$

- (g) Determine the density of the sphere using the equation shown.

$$\rho = \frac{m}{V}$$

$$\begin{aligned} \rho &= \frac{5.42}{2.1} \\ &= 2.6 \text{ g / cm}^3 \end{aligned}$$

$$\rho = \underline{2.6 \text{ g / cm}^3}$$

- (h) Suggest a change to the apparatus so that V can be measured **directly**.

Use a measuring cylinder.



2. In this experiment, you will investigate the power dissipated in a resistance wire.

You are provided with

- a power supply,
- an ammeter,
- a voltmeter,
- a switch,
- a crocodile clip labelled X,
- a variable resistor,
- a length of resistance wire attached to a metre rule,
- leads and crocodile clips.

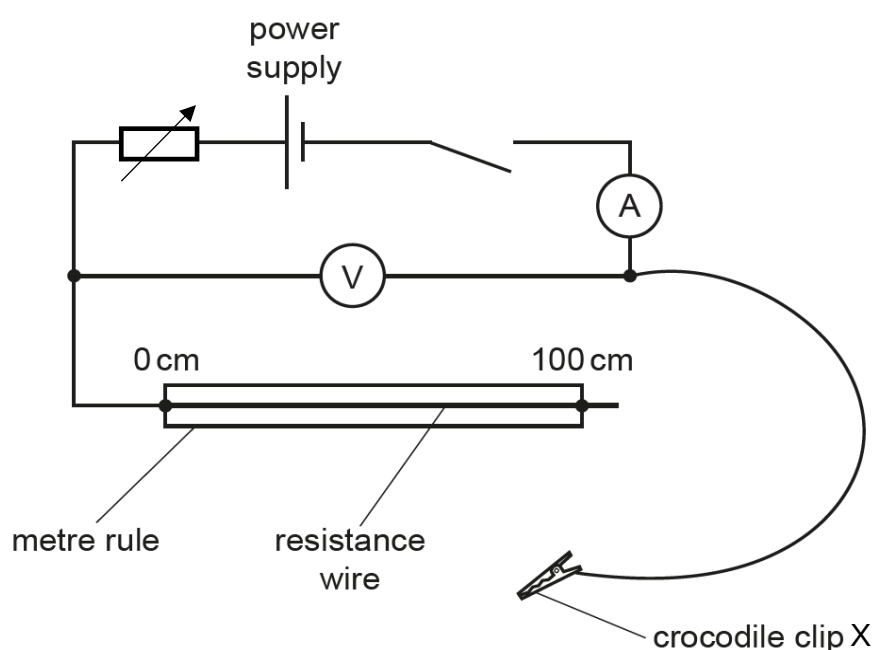

(a) The circuit shown in Fig. 2.1 has been set up for you.

- (i) Connect the crocodile clip X at the 50.0 cm mark so that the length of resistance wire in the circuit is 50.0 cm.

Close the switch.

Adjust the variable resistor until the voltmeter reading is 1.00 V. Measure and record potential difference (p.d.) V_1 across the resistance wire and the current I_1 through the resistance wire.

Open the switch.

$V_1 = 1.00 \text{ V}$

$I_1 = 0.14 \text{ A (accept 0.12 to 0.16)}$



- (ii) Calculate the power P dissipated across the 50.0 cm length of wire using the equation shown.

$$P_1 = V_1 \times I_1$$

$$\begin{aligned} P_1 &= 1.00 \times 0.14 \\ &= 0.14 \\ &= 0.14 \text{ W} \end{aligned}$$

$$\underline{P_1 = 0.14 \text{ W}}$$

- (b) Do not adjust the variable resistor. Remove the crocodile clip X and connect it so that the length of resistance wire in the circuit is 80.0 cm.

- (i) Close the switch.

Measure and record the potential difference (p.d.) V_2 across the wire and the current I_2 through the wire.

$$\underline{V_2 = 1.20 \text{ V}}$$

$$\underline{I_2 = 0.11 \text{ A}}$$

- (ii) Calculate the power P_2 dissipated across the 80.0 cm length of wire.

$$\begin{aligned} P_1 &= 1.20 \times 0.11 \\ &= 0.224 \\ &= 0.13 \text{ W} \end{aligned}$$

$$\underline{P_2 = 0.13 \text{ W}}$$



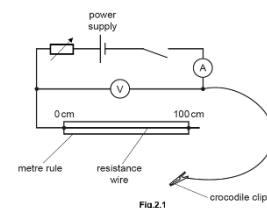
(a) A student claims that $P = GL$.

where G is a constant and L is the length of the resistance wire in the circuit.

Plan an experiment to find out if the student's claim is correct.

In your plan, you should:

- identify **one** other key variable,
- describe how you would perform the experiment,
- sketch the graph that you would obtain using preliminary observations,
- how G can be obtained from your graph,
- explain **one** precaution that you should take to ensure the accuracy of the experiment.



1. Resistance of the variable resistance should remain constant.
2. Setup the experiment as shown in Fig. 2.1.
3. Connect the crocodile clip at the 50 cm mark on the resistance wire.
4. Measure and record the current flowing (through the resistance wire) using the ammeter. Measure and record the potential difference (across the resistance wire) using the voltmeter. Open the switch so that the circuit does not heat up. Calculate the power using $P = IV$.
5. Repeat step 3 and 4 by connecting the crocodile clip at different positions on the resistance wire. Take a total of 5 sets of readings.
6. Plot a graph of P against L (DV against IV)
7. Graph drawn is straight line linked to P1 and P2. P/W L/cm P/W L/cm
8. Constant G can be obtained by finding the gradient of the graph.
9. Open the switch when not taking reading to ensure that the wire does not heat up.



Section B

3. In this experiment, you will determine the focal length of a thin converging lens.

You have been provided with

- a converging lens,
- a lens holder,
- cross wire object,
- a light source mounted on a stand,
- a screen,
- a metre rule,
- an A4 piece of card.

(a) Describe how you could estimate the focal length of a converging lens using just a lens and a screen.

Use the converging lens to focus the sharp image of a distant object on the screen. AND

Measure the distance of the screen to the lens to find the focal length.

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(b) Set up the apparatus as shown in Fig. 3.1.

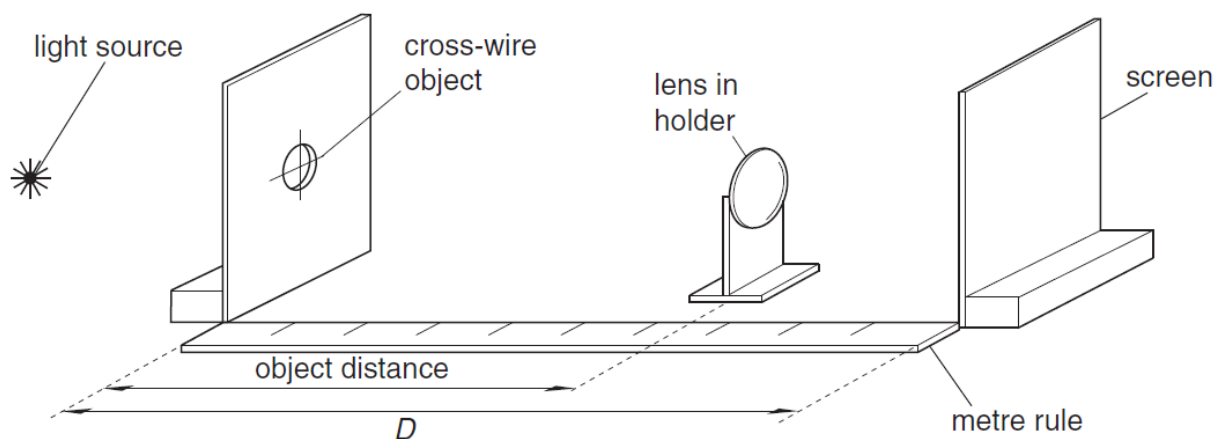

The cross-wire object is at the 0.0 cm end of the rule and the screen is at the 90.0 cm

By only changing the position of the lens, obtain an image on the screen that is **smaller** than the object. You may hold the A4 piece of card above the set-up to block some light from the surroundings in order to see the image more clearly.



Measure and record the distance u_s , between the object and the centre of the lens when the image is **smaller** than the object and is in sharp focus on the screen.

$$u_s = \underline{71.4 \text{ cm (accept 64.0 to 79.0)}}$$

- (c) By changing the position of the lens, obtain an image on the screen that is **larger** than the object.

Measure and record the distance u_L , between the object and the centre of the lens when the image is **larger** than the object and is in sharp focus on the screen.

$$u_L = \underline{19.0 \text{ cm (accept 17.0 to 21.0)}}$$

- (d) Describe two ways in which you ensured your values for u_s , and u_L , were accurate

1 Lens, object and light source at the same height / in line with each other.

2. Lens, object and screen parallel to each other / perpendicular to metre rule.

- (e) In order to change from an image that is smaller than the object to an image that is larger than the object, the lens has been moved by a distance d .

- (i) Calculate d using $d = u_s - u_L$.

$$\begin{aligned} d &= 71.4 - 19.0 \\ &= 52.4 \text{ cm} \end{aligned}$$

$$d = \underline{52.4 \text{ cm}}$$

- (ii) Calculate y using $y = D^2 - d^2$,
where D is the distance between the object and the screen.

$$\begin{aligned} y &= (90.0)^2 - (52.4)^2 \\ &= 8100 - 2750 \\ &= 5350 \text{ cm}^2 \end{aligned}$$

$$y = \underline{5960 \text{ cm}^2}$$



- (f) Repeat (b), (c) and (e) using different values of D in the range of 60 cm to 100 cm.

The object should remain at the 0.0 cm mark on the rule and the position of the screen should be changed to give different values of D . Record your results for D , u_s , u_L , d , D^2 , d^2 and y in a table, including those from (b), (c) and (e).

- (ii) the focal length of the lens using the equation $f = G / 4$.

$$f = 59.7 / 4$$

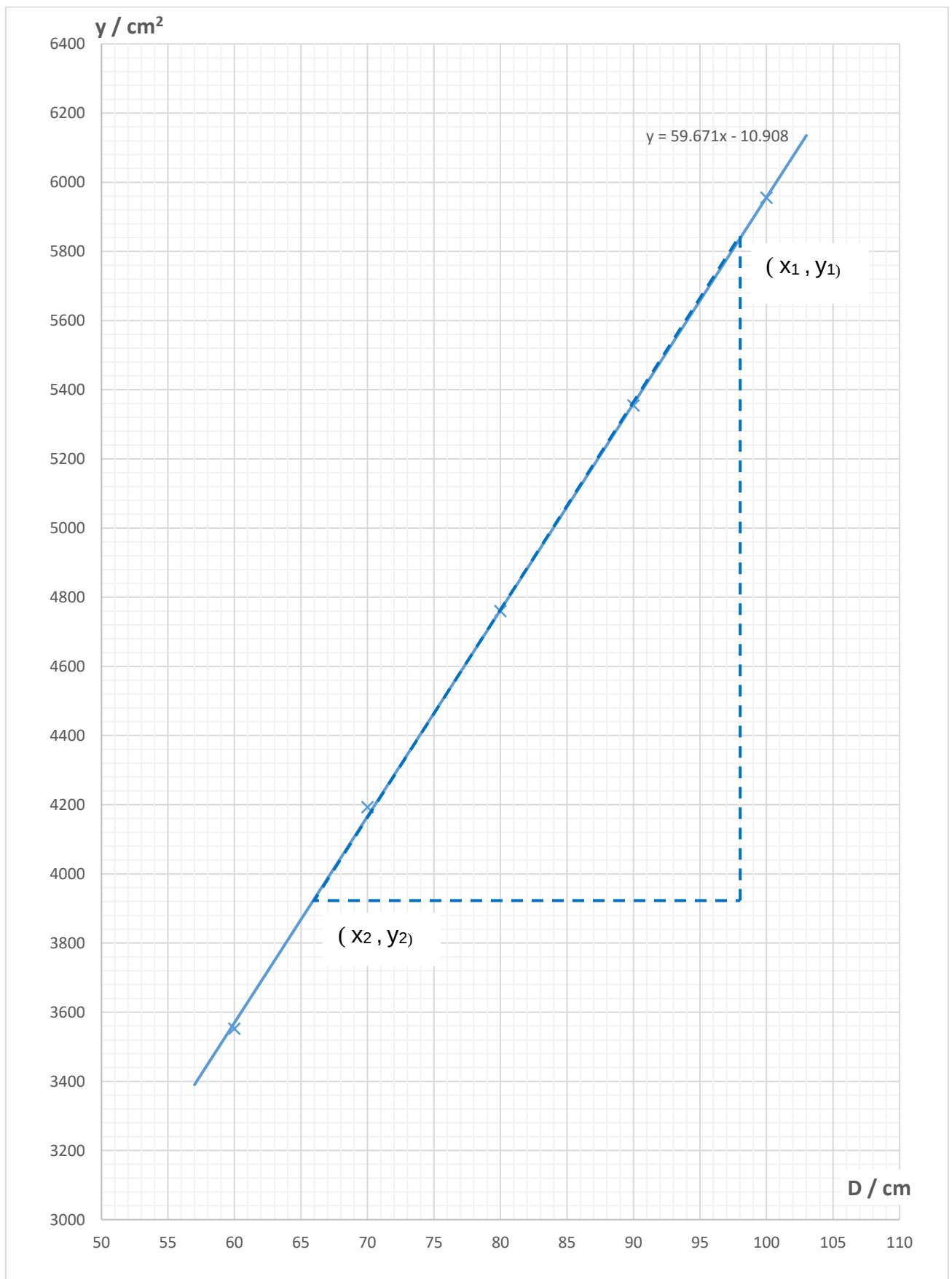

- (j) Suggest why the experiment cannot be conducted for values of D that are less than 50 cm.

A sharp image cannot be seen on the screen.
